"GOOD" FRIDAY ?

What is good about "Good" Friday? "Bad" Friday might have seemed a better name, given what happened. You would not expect people to want to mark a day when an innocent man was cruelly tortured and horribly killed by calling it "good". So why did they, and why do we still?

In order to realize why it is good, we firstly have to recognize how terrible were the things that happened. We do not call it good because we ignore the horrors or pretend that they did not take place. On the contrary! It is precisely because of those horrific events that we can call the day good.

On Good Friday, human beings showed how terrible and evil they could be, while God showed how loving and forgiving He always is. That is why the day is so "good": something came about that had never happened before. God shows us in Jesus that there is absolutely no limit to His love. God is always giving and giving again. He gives everything to us.

Jesus put no limits, no boundaries or restrictions upon the love that he gave. He did not say, "This far but no farther." Quite the opposite! He was prepared to give to the utmost, without any limit, even when it cost everything - and it did.

A good person might be prepared to lay down his life for his friend or family in exceptional circumstances. Jesus laid down his life for those who regarded themselves as his enemies. It takes a very remarkable person to do that, someone so remarkable that he is God-like.

God shows us in Jesus that his kind of love always gives itself and puts the other first. He shows us also that there is absolutely nothing that can stop that love. People tried to stop Jesus loving, to turn away from the truth of God, but they failed. They tried with their arguments, their threats, their prejudice, their power, their private interests, their indifference, their hatred, their physical torture: they tried with every weapon they had at their disposal. Not one of them worked. They couldn't, because God's love is stronger, stronger than anything else in all the world or beyond it.

Nothing can kill the love of God. That is what Good Friday reveals for ever. That is why Jesus' death had to be followed by his resurrection: God's love is alive and always will be. Because Jesus died for us on the cross, we know that we can be forgiven and that nothing can separate us from God and His love.

Small wonder that we call that Friday "GOOD"!

## COLESHILL VILLAGE HALL

It is nearly ten years since the new Hall was opened and the Committee are planning a social evening to celebrate. The exact form of the event has not yet been finalised but it is hoped to attract as many residents of Coleshill as possible - both the young and the not so young - to a unique Village event. The provisional date is Saturday 19 December. Please put this in your diary, and watch this space for further details.

Coleshill has had a Hall on this site since 1903 when the land was given to the Village by Lord Howe. The first building was a small Parish Room which stood until the present Hall was built ten years ago. The Parish Room was supplemented by an ex RAF barrack hut which was erected after World War I, and both buildings stood on the site until demolished to make room for the new Hall in 1982.

The new Hall was financed by raising £25,000 from the people of the Village and the balance was funded by Bucks County Council. The fund-raising in the Village involved very many people in many events and was a great achievement for a small village with a population of only 700 or so. The many events had the added advantage of building and strengthening the community spirit in the Village.

We do hope a large number of people will support the Tenth Anniversary event on 19 December.

The Annual General Meeting of the Hall is arranged for Thursday 30 April at 8.15pm and we hope that as many people as possible will be able to attend. We are interested to hear your views. As usual there will be a glass of wine after the meeting.

## COLESHILL COMMON AND POND

Sixty years ago there were hardly more than half a dozen trees on the Common. It has reached its present condition by being left alone. If it continues to be left alone, another sixty years will see it nothing but trees! If we want to keep the Common more or less as it is now, it needs active management. That is why the Parish Council has taken the action described in its supplement to this Newsletter and has set up a Management Committee to plan a co-ordinated management plan for the whole of the Common, including the Pond.

That Committee has decided that, following the work on the pond carried out last autumn, the next priority target areas should be the woodlands which will be tackled area by area. Suitable coppicing of parts of the undergrowth, section by section, to promote its renewal are needed and this work should best be carried out starting in October. The Committee would be very receptive to suggestions, ideas and offers of assistance from any villager, including not only views on WHAT needs to be done, but also on HOW it could best be achieved. Patsy Wright-Warren (433356) will collate and co-ordinate any such offers and comments and will pass them on to the Committee.

## COLESHILL COMMON

Miss Ann Trotman has proposed that the Parish Council might like to consider working towards the Common being recognised as a Local Nature Reserve. If a management plan could be worked out to co-ordinate mowing, felling of trees and other clearance, these could be done with the interest of the natural history there as the primary concern instead of haphazardly.

She has already been involved in such a scheme elsewhere and would be pleased to offer her help in Coleshill. She suggests that we might involve BBONT and/or RSPB. It might, next year, be a suitable project to enter for the annual Bucks CVS Village Ventures Competition.

At the last meeting of the Parish Council, concern was expressed about the danger of development in the absence of a known owner for the Common. Since then the Clerk has been pursuing enquiries but without achieving anything. Registration as a local nature reserve might help to protect its open status.

## What Can Local Councils Do?

(A summary of their powers for those who want better villages and towns)

The powers which have been vested in Parish, Town and Community Councils by Acts of Parliament are summarised in this leaflet as a guide to Councillors and others. Each description is brief and is intended to be a general indication. Like all powers given to public bodies the powers of local councils are defined in detail in legislation and these details may include a requirement to obtain the consent of another body (for example the approval of the County Council to the provision of a car park). Local Councils must exercise their powers also subject to the provisions of the general law (for example planning permission is necessary for a sports pavilion). Information on all these details should be in the hands of the Clerks of the Councils. The standard text-book, *Local Council Administration* by Charles Arnold-Baker, which is sold by the Association, is the complete guide to the powers and functions of local councils.

The powers are listed alphabetically. Where a power is marked with an asterisk the council may, in addition to exercising the power itself, help another body to act by giving financial assistance.

**Allotments** Provision and maintenance of allotments for cultivation.

**"Arts** Developing and improving knowledge of the arts and the crafts which serve the arts.

**Baths** Provision of baths and wash-houses (which in modern terms may mean a launderette).

**\*Cemeteries** Provision and maintenance of burial grounds, or cemeteries, or crematoria.

**Churchyards** Power to contribute to the costs of a churchyard in use and a duty to maintain any closed churchyard where the duty has been transferred by the Church.

**\*Clocks** Provision and maintenance of public clocks, on churches or elsewhere.

**Commons** Power to protect any finally registered common which has no registered owner.

**\*Entertainments** Provision of any form of public entertainment and any premises for giving entertainments. (This includes maintaining bands or orchestras and providing for dancing.)

**Footpaths** Maintenance of public footpaths and bridleways.

**\*Halls** Provision of buildings for public meetings and functions, for indoor sports or physical recreation, or for the use of clubs or societies having recreational, social or athletic objects.

**Legal Proceedings** Power to prosecute and defend any legal proceedings in the interests of the inhabitants. Power to take part in any public local inquiry.

**Lighting** Provision and maintenance of any footway lighting which lights roads or pavements provided the columns are not above specified heights.

**\*Litter** Provision of litter-bins in streets and support for anti-litter campaigns.

**Mortuaries** Provision of mortuaries and post mortem rooms.

**Open Spaces Provision** and maintenance of public open spaces, pleasure grounds and public walks.

**Parking Places** Provision and management of car and cycle parks,

**Parks** Provision and maintenance of public parks and appropriate facilities.

**Planning** Local councils have a right to be notified of any planning application affecting their area and to make comments which the planning authority must take into account.

**\*Playing Fields** Provision and maintenance of land for any kind of outdoor recreation, including boating pools.

**\*Ponds** Power to deal with ponds, pools, or other places containing filth or matter prejudicial to health.

**Post and Telephone** Power to guarantee the postal or telephone authorities against a loss on a facility.

**Public Lavatories** Provision and maintenance of public lavatories.

**Roadside Verges** Power to plant and maintain roadside verges,

**\*Seats** Provision and maintenance of public seats on the highway.

**\*Shelters** Provision and maintenance of shelters for general public use and also particularly for bus passengers.

**Signs** Power to erect signs which warn of dangers or announce a place name, or indicate a bus stop.

**\*Swimming** Provision of indoor or outdoor swimming pools or bathing places,

**\*Tourism** Provision of facilities for conferences and encouragement of recreational and business tourism.

**\*Village Green** Powers to maintain the village or town green.

**General Expenditure Power** In any situation not covered by one of the specific powers described above a council may spend money on any purpose which in its opinion is of benefit to its area or to the inhabitants. The total expenditure by the council on all the cases under this general power must not in any financial year exceed the product of a 2p rate for the parish or town or community. (This power is often called 'The Free Two Pence'.)

## COLESHILL COMMON AND POND

At its last meeting on 14th January, the Council approved the setting up of a Management Committee for Coleshill Common and that it should present a management plan to the Parish Council for its approval.

The Management Committee consisting of Mr Wright, Chairman, Mr Barber, Mr Chenevix Trench, Miss Trotman and Miss Wright-Warren met on 5th March and agreed the following:

- that the necessary action be taken for the Parish Council to acquire ownership of the Common, as resolved at the last meeting, should be taken as soon as possible.
- that the Management Plan, now attached, should be presented to the Parish Council at its meeting on 12th March;
- that we should not, at present go through the rather complicated procedure to register the Common as a Local Nature Reserve, though this could be reconsidered at a later date.

### MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR COLESHILL COMMON AND POND

#### 1. Description of site.

The site comprises the village pond and the common area shown on the attached sketch map and described in the vegetation schedule. It can conveniently be divided into four types of area, each of which will require a different style of management. They are:

Area A. The open-spaced central grassed area.

Area B. The woodlands (map sections 1-13) surrounding the above.

Area C. The village pond and its surrounds.

Area D. The 'wetlands' areas (map sections 1 & 4).

#### 2. General Objectives.

To protect and conserve the unenclosed character and naturalness of the site for the benefit of its flora, fauna and other wildlife and for its quiet enjoyment by the public on foot.

#### 3. Individual Area Objectives.

Area A. Planned, controlled mowing.

Area B. Appropriate coppicing and undergrowth clearing.

Area C. Continuation of ecological management already started.

Area D. After scrub clearance, consider the improvement possibilities.
